<u>Lighting the villages: Grandmother solar</u> engineers at work

28 June 2013, Bahr's Town, Liberia - It was a moment to watch and a memory to keep as non-literate elderly women solar engineers worked together to install solar light in Barh's Town, a village which has been in darkness since it was established. Harnessing the energy of the sun, women solar engineers can build and maintain small units which provide households with light and which can provide health centers and other community infrastructures with lighting. "I am glad that we can have light because light is life. When light is somewhere, there is no darkness", Wilmont Sackie George, Bahr's Town Community Chief.

There were cheers and applause all around, yet others stood in disbelief as they watched the older women confidently mount the panels on the roof, studying the sun's direction and positioning the panels, using their tools to test the panel and connecting the wires to the bulbs. Bahr's Town is one of the communities selected for the pilot phase of the rural electrification initiative being supported by UN Women for women in rural communities in Liberia

In 2011, eight rural women from four communities across Liberia were provided an opportunity to travel to India to learn how to

build, install and operate a solar light system. As a result of the training, the women are now play this critical role in their communities. During the six months course at Barefoot College in India, they and other rural women from Africa, Asia and Latin America took part in a hands-on training which focused on building their skills and knowledge in this area, through watching and doing.

As a result of the training, women and men in Barh's Town, Juah's Town, Bambala and Salayea will begin to have solar light. In most rural towns in Liberia, there is no access to electricity; women and their families depend on candles, kerosene lights and in some cases the burning embers of a cooking fire as sources of lights. In addition to the risks of these means of lighting, the high cost of kerosene as well as the cost of candles represents a significant financial burden on already overstretched household budgets.

"The solar panel light will really do well for us, it will help us save our small small money. The money we suppose to use to buy kerosene to put in the lantern for us to see and for our children to study can be given to the children the next day for their recess in school", said Ma Momo of Bahr's Town.

The women are proud even though they cannot read and write, they are engineers with knowledge and skills which can serve their communities. They are particularly proud because they also know that most engineers are men and most times literate.

Working with the Ministry of Gender and Development, Bindu Sackie, Betty Cooper, Marie Weeks, Musu Junius, Massa Madave, Mama Bawor, Yassa Gbomelee and Garmai Yakpazuo were brought together in Bahr's Town for a week long refresher training in their skills which they will now be put to use in their respective villages. Upon arrival, they welcomed one another warmly with a smile and saying "Namaste" which in Hindi means "you are welcome". Over the next few months, more households in three other towns in rural Liberia will have light. With solar light at nighttime, children will be able to study and mothers will feel more secure, knowing that they can go to sleep without having to worry about risk.

The Ministry of Gender and Development and UN Women will continue to support them in putting their skills to use while also encouraging other rural women to pursue training as barefoot solar engineers as well as to encourage other young women to pursue higher degrees in the sciences.

Bringing light to rural communities, helping women to gain confidence in themselves and become role models for other women in their communities, are important steps in empowering women and in transforming a nation. As Chief Wilmont Sackie George had said, where there is light there is life.
