ADVOCACY

Business discussed:

An update on our efforts to ascertain what, if anything, we may be able to do for the women currently being held in Detention Centres was given. Lorraine had a response from Mark Isaacs who provided an email address for a Brisbane based refugee advocate. Although Lorraine has emailed this person, Frederika Steen, there has been no reply. Lorraine will resend the email and also contact Mark Isaacs again. The idea we are exploring is to simply perhaps send some personal items that the women would enjoy, at the same time sending a message that there are women in Australia who have concerns for their wellbeing.

The District's request for information about our club's activities regarding Domestic Violence was discussed and a list made of our activities. This list will need to be checked and other activities added.

- Zonta Kids Corner in the CRDVS Centre furnished with a colourful mat, toys and cushions.
- Bookcase donated by an individual Club member.
- Richard Droughton constructed a beautiful counselling Sand Tray according to dimensions provided by CRDVS staff.
- Annual Provision of Emergency Packs, Christmas Gifts for Women Clients, Long-Life food items for tea/ breakfast during emergency family overnight motel accommodation and Blanket Bags (zipped closed with

handles) to carry personal belongings/items to a safe home with relatives etc,

- Safety Information Cards (initiated by our Club but costs shared with both the ZC of Pine Rivers and Redcliffe), Food Hampers at Christmas.
- Two members present at various Steering Committee meetings chaired by the CRDVS manager looking into the feasibility of providing a Safe House of Low Risk status (of violent, angry men "storming" the Safe house) in Caboolture. This would be funded by local community groups - depending on costs and funds raised our Club voted to either furnish it throughout or furnish one room to be called The Zonta Room. After months of meeting the Steering Committee decide that it was not a feasible project and the idea was abandoned.
 - Funds for a Badge Program in Regional primary schools during Domestic Violence Week and for a Poster Project in secondary schools.
 - Funding refreshments for programs educating young boys and adolescents re domestic violence hoping to break the cycle of violence by males.
 - Funding individual women/CRDVS Clients including the most vulnerable women with disabilities who have experienced Domestic Violence to undertake personal development courses supplied by State Government Domestic Violence Services.
 - Provision of two, two-seater counselling sofas for the CRDVS Centre so that women undergoing counselling can have a nominated friend present or can mind a baby comfortably as opposed to putting their baby/toddler on the floor.
 - Partnering for the launch of Zonta Says No to violence against women in 2013
 - Partnering in the Caboolture Regional Violence Service Dinner on 24 November 2014 focussing on violence against women in order to raise funds for programs in Regional schools.
 - Attending Annual General Meetings of Caboolture Regional Domestic Violence Service, including one member being the Keynote Speaker.
 - Funding of a Life Skills program at Arethusa College, a last chance school for identified girls. This program was designed to assist young girls to recognise problem behaviours relating to violence, drugs etc and teaching them what to do to keep themselves safe. One of our members also assisted in the weekly sessions.
 - Funding of Hit Like a Girl, a self-defence and personal development program for selected girls in a local High School.
 - Ongoing activities with the Zonta Says No campaign

The third matter discussed was the CRDVS fundraising dinner to be held on Monday $24^{\rm th}$ November.

Lorraine is to contact Sara to see how the bookings are going. A meeting with the CRDVS people will be needed to check arrangements at least two weeks prior to the event.

Lastly the proposed Safe Buses for Port Moresby project was discussed. The almost completed power-point presentation which would be the basis of our advocacy presentation to community clubs and schools was viewed and tidied up. The paperwork, booking and feedback forms, as looked at for typos. From the planning perspective, this project is now ready to be presented to the club members for their consideration. It is hoped that this can be done before the Christmas break as, if adopted, the New Year is the best time to contact schools etc to seek bookings.

The next meeting will be on the second Tuesday of November, the 11th, at Carole's home.

UNITED NATIONS

First women's cooperatives changing lives and lands in Upper Egypt

A cattle-raising cooperative in Luxor has secured decent jobs and working conditions where 26 women earn an income and are the primary decision-makers on land and the division of labour.

Green fields dotted with bright red tomatoes line the arid countryside around the village of Al Tod, in the Egyptian



governorate of Luxor (a municipality some 300 km from the capital, Cairo). The sun shines as warm winds blow the dresses and headscarves of women who are sorting and clearing the fields. Nearby, men check the irrigation system to make sure water is reaching all tiny roots. A vast change, from just one year ago, when many of these same fields were barren.

Twenty six of these local women used to be members of the Al Tod Agricultural Community Development

Farmers' Association, but since the land was owned only by their male counterparts, the men dominated decision-making and did not let the women have a say.

After years of marginalization and hardship, the 26 women left the association and formed a cooperative, which spurred them to independently start raising cattle - a new source of income for them. The cooperative has secured decent jobs and working conditions for these women, nearby and where the women are shareholders and make the decisions on the division of labour or buying livestock.

"People used to resist my leadership in the farmer's association or any other institution," says Amal Abel Aziz, the 33-year-old female engineer who helped form the cooperative. A divorcee with a Bachelor's degree in Architectural Engineering, she has had to overcome multiple challenges. "I decided not to listen to what others say and just focus on my goals and how to achieve them."

The poverty rate in Upper Egyptian governorates is much higher than in Lower Egypt, as cultural, social and religious norms hinder women in rural areas from taking advantage of work opportunities outside the home. They are also disadvantaged by gender discrimination in wages and work conditions. According to Egypt's Human Development Report 2008, Upper Egypt's share of the country's extreme poor is 66 per cent, with almost 95 per cent of the poorest villages located in Upper Egypt.

According to the 2012 report of Egypt's Central Agency for Census and Statistics, women are officially registered as comprising only 23 per cent of the formal, registered workforce. But because much of their work is informal, the World Food Programme estimates that in reality women account for more than 75 per cent of the agricultural labour force in Upper Egypt.

The new women's cooperative is part of the "Pro-poor Horticulture Value Chains in Upper Egypt" (Salasel) project, an MDG-funded Joint Programme designed to improve the efficiency of the horticulture and agribusiness sector in Upper Egypt, in efforts to combat poverty. The joint programme brings together four UN organizations - the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO), International Labour Organization (ILO) and UN Women - in a partnership with the Egyptian Ministry of Industry and Trade and the Ministry of Investment. By organizing income-generating activities, it aims to improve the position of small farmers in export and domestic markets and create decent and secure employment in the region for both men and women.

"Through our work in this cooperative, each woman will have a monthly income of at least 300 to 400 Egyptian pounds," explains Amal. As members of the farm association, they used to have no monthly income.

Two other cooperatives have also been established in Beni Sueif, another governorate in Upper Egypt.

"Empowering women and addressing the lingering negative challenges are among the priorities for UN Women," says Mohammad Naciri, UN Women Country Representative in Egypt. In one year, UN Women has launched three women-led cooperatives in Upper Egypt to push forward women's inclusion in the economy and advance gender equality. One of our goals is to bring forward women's leadership in the economy and provide them with real income-generating opportunities."

The cooperative's launch took place at the governorate in June 2013, with representatives from UN Women, the Joint Programme and Misr El Kheir Foundation. UN Women and the founding members have worked closely with Misr el Kheir Foundation, providing income-generating assets (such as cattle), business development training and technical support (such as training on how to raise and care for cattle).

"After heading the cooperative, I became more ambitious and independent," said Amal, at the launch event. "One day, I will be Luxor's governor and will make decisions to improve people's income and well-being."
