From the Board Meeting - 11 June


Birthing Kits - From Cathy:

UNITED NATIONS REPORT

ALGERIA ELECTS WOMEN LEGISLATORS IN RECORD NUMBERS



Algeria has become the first and only country in the Arab world to have more than 30 per cent of its parliamentary seats held by women, according to the Inter-Parliamentary Union (IPU).IPU reports that 145 women were elected last parliamentarians during week's elections in Algeria. In the outgoing parliament, women MPs accounted for less than eight per cent of the elected legislators.

Jemini Pandya, spokesperson for the Inter-Parliamentary Union, says Algeria is now ranked among the top countries worldwide with a large proportion of women legislators.

"The outcome of these latest elections means Algeria will now leapfrog into the top 25 countries. The large increase in the number of women now in the Algerian parliament has partly been the result of a new law on women's political participation. In a proportional representation system, it

set quotas for women candidates on political party list depending on the size of a constituency."

Lorraine's comment: As I read the above on ZI website, I remembered that earlier in the year I had read some figures about female representation in the various State Governments and the Australian Federal government that left me underwhelmed with confidence for our democracy. I searched again and came up with the following:

According to data from the Australian Centre of Excellence for Local Government, there are approximately 200,000 elected members and employees in local government. Around half of all employees are women and yet:

- Women represent less than 30 per cent of councillors and elected members
- Only 20 per cent of women are employed as senior executives, and
- Only seven per cent of CEOs are women.
- According to the Australian Bureau of Statistics, women comprise half of Australia's total population (50.2 per cent in 2010).[3] However, as Table 1 shows, women comprise less than one-third (30.1 per cent) of all parliamentarians in Australia's parliaments. In the Commonwealth Parliament, there is a higher proportion of women in the Senate or upper house (38.2 per cent) than in the House of Representatives or lower house (24.7 per cent). The Senate has traditionally had a higher proportion of women than the House of Representatives. This is also true of those states with a

bicameral parliament, with the exception of Victoria where women comprise one-third of both chambers.
