FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

When do clubs meet?

May standing club committees be combined?

Yes

What is the limit to club office?

A club officer or director may serve no more than two consecutive years in the same office, except the treasurer who may serve no more than four.

May Zonta endorse a political conditate?

Zonta International, its districts, clubs and members do not endorse candidates for elective offices in the name of Zonta. Individual Zonta members are of course free to endorse and support different causes, but not in the name of Zonta. Nevertheless, a high profile member who is closely identified with Zonta, such as the International President, District Governor, Area Director and other Zonta leaders must be careful in undertaking any activity with "political" character.

May clubs group together within a country or state?

All clubs within a country or state are permitted to group together within their country or state solely for the purpose of promoting the objects of Zonta International. Special guidelines apple.

a little light relief

Majella: A pilgrim's progress visiting the Saints of Ireland - Along with eighteen other members and friends of the Townsville Diocese, I undertook a pilgrimage to Ireland last June. You may have followed their progress in the Catholic News supplement in the Townsville Bulletin. Although the pilgrims (including Bishop Putney) were only away for a fortnight, we managed to spend a few days at the 50th International Eucharistic Congress, attended by thousands from around the world, and the home of the Venerable Catherin McAuley (founder of the Sisters of Mercy). While in Dublin; went to the first Centre established by Blessed Edmund Ignatius Rice (founder of the Christian Brothers and the Presentations Brothers) in Waterford before watching Waterford crystal being made in its factory; visited the places known for the Saints whose names are significant to the Townsville Diocese eg Saints Bridget, Colman, Columba, Kevin, Kieran, Oliver Plunkett & Patrick (and probably a few others!). In addition, we visited Cork, Kildare, Killarney, Limerick, the Dingle Peninsula, Kylemore Abbey (where one of the Benedictine nuns grew up in Richmond, Qld), Galway Bay on sunset plus much more. The weather, though summertime, was cooler (and wetter) than the winter we had left behind in North Queensland but the spectacularly beautiful scenery and welcoming people lived up to their reputations.

Karen: Karen and Neville are hosting the latest Rotary Exchange student for the next 3 months. Ayano 17, is from Hokkaido, the northern most island in Japan. This is Ayano's first overseas trip, and the biggest hurdle is the language. She has had 3 years of high school English, but actually coping in an English speaking country is proving quite a challenge. She is attending Ayr State High, Grade 11 and will then spend the first half of next year in Grade 12. Ayano walked in the Water Festival Parade and then helped at the Rotary stall making hamburgers. She is a black belt in karate, having been the prefecture (state) high school champion 4 times. She is also a keen snow boarder, plays badminton, and also the electric guitar. We are taking Ayano to Cape Upstart for the first week



of the school holidays so let's hope she takes well to fishing, snorkelling, pulling up the crab pots and riding up on the nose of the boat.

Robyn: Graeme and I returned on sunday from 5 ½ weeks away and the best part is we have returned lighter than when we left. We have walked our feet off but have seen so much. Our first stop was Dubrovnik complete with a heat wave that was raging across Europe. It was 42 degrees and we felt every one of those. Dubrovnik harbour was just spectacular; the country side was feeling the heat; but in a wine cellar where we had lunch, set in the rock, the temperature was cool. This wine cellar had been a secret place during communism where they had hidden the wine they had sold privately. All of it should have gone to the state. It was very confronting seeing the hill where the enemy had fired their bullets during the recent war with the holes still visible in the walls around the town. Our guide said she had forgiven but could never forget what they had been through. Ephesus, a Roman city being excavated in Turkey was mind blowing. I especially loved that the magnificent library had a secret tunnel under the road directly to the "house of ill repute" on the corner opposite it. Oldest profession? Their toilets were interesting. Made of marble as is everything, it was suggested that the slaves had warmed it up or cooled it down first for the masters. Can imagine why! Taormina in Sicily a medieval town was beautiful and so charming with its own functioning Roman theatre. We call them amphitheatres but that is technically 2 theatres. This one has views of Mt Etna and during one night time performance of Verdi she decided to erupt. As you can imagine they said it was a spectacular backdrop being directly behind the stage. Sicily was very pretty with no shortage of water which was a surprise to me. Gaudi for Spain is huge but seriously that man was on something. His own tutor did not know whether he was a fail or a genius. Everyone has their opinion. Majorca – I have never seen so many huge luxurious boats. I would have been happy with one of their lowly runabouts. Tunis (Carthage) was spell binding with Roman ruins once again. I have become obsessed with the Romans who were brilliant engineers. They have just unearthed 11 aquaducts in Tunis which we were lucky to see as they are not even on the tourist maps yet. There were more blue and white houses in Tunis (influence of the Jews) than in Santorini by a country mile. Of course we went to Pompeii, again mind blowing and then we

explored Rome with the Colosseum, Forum, Pantheon, Trevi Fountain (the last fountain working on a Roman aquaduct), and every vacant block within the ancient city has ruins on them. We ran out of superlatives. And then there is the Vatican. That has the most incredible art one could ever imagine. Interestly we were told that a lot of Italians have not been to the Vatican. Because they live there.. We saw Leonardo Da Vinci's exhibition of his designs. So ahead of his time and things we take for granted now such as bearings Graeme was taken wih. He was such a genius. And then there is Florence, Tuscany and Umbria – such glorious countryside and history and more magnificent art. It is said that 70% of the world's art is in Italy and only a fraction is on display. Italy was everything I could have imagined and much more.
