
DATE CLAIMERS, REMINDERS, & EVENT INFORMATION

MALALA POWER BRINGS CHANGE TO PAKISTAN

Members will likely have heard of 15-year-old Pakistani, Malala Yousufuzi, who in October was shot in the head by Taliban in her country for her promotion of girls' right to education.

This remarkably brave young woman continues to recover from her injuries in a hospital in the UK, surrounded by her family, but she has inspired countless people worldwide and as well as reaching far, far outside Pakistan, her courage, passion and her message have brought change already to the women of her homeland – those she most wanted to help.



In a letter to the I AM MALALA website, UN Special Envoy for Global Education, Gordon Brown, noted that because of the overwhelming number of signatories to a petition on behalf of Malala, Pakistan has in late November voted for the first time to introduce free and compulsory education. An estimated three million boys and girls will now receive cash stipends to help them go to school and all political parties are now discussing doubling the education expenditure of Pakistan from 2 per cent to 4 per cent of national income.

SIXTEEN SPECIAL DAYS FOR REFLECTION AND RESOLVE

On the subject of Malala, it is timely to note that we are currently in the midst of the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence, a period observed since October 1991 and which emerged as a result of the Global Campaign for Women's Human Rights. During the 16 days, the campaign highlights the connections between women, violence and human rights from November 25 through December 10. The period encompasses four significant dates: 25 November, the International Day against Violence Against Women; 1 December, World AIDS Day; 6 December, the anniversary of the 1989 Montreal Massacre, when 14 engineering students were



gunned down at Montreal's Ecole Polytechnique by a gunman shouting "I hate feminists"; and 10 December, Human Rights Day. In the mist of the pre-Christmas frenzy, this could be the ideal time to take a little quiet time for reflection and resolve.

PAST PRIZEWINNER COMPLETES WORLD'S LARGEST SELF-INJURY SURVEY

If you have ever wondered what becomes of the people who are recipients of the Club's various awards (and the good work they are undertaking), recent news is that Professor Graham Martin, winner of our 2009 Helen Row Zonta International Memorial Prize, has surveyed a representative sample of 12,006 randomly selected Australians to determine the prevalence of self-injury – the world's largest survey of self-harm.

Professor Martin, Professor of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at the University of Queensland, is also Clinical Director of the Royal Children's Hospital and Health Service District Child and Youth Mental Health Service. His research is dedicated to suicide prevention and he played a formative role in Australia's National Youth Suicide prevention Strategy. He currently chairs Queensland Health's Mental Health promotion and Early Intervention Committee and his main passion is working in the area of self-injury in young people.

The key findings in his latest survey include: the prevalence of self-injury was an alarming 8.1 %; high rates were seen in the 15-19 year age group (females being 16.6% and males 11.6%); males used different methods of self-injury, deliberately hitting a body part against a hard surface or punching, hitting or slapping oneself, while females tended to cut or severely scratch themselves; the most common motivation for self-injury was management of emotions; nearly two-thirds of those who self-injure never ask for help; and only 14% receive medical treatment.
