The Early Years



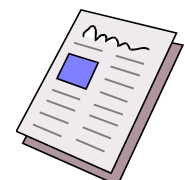
Amelia Earhart Day— 11th January

On 2 July 1928, as Amelia Earhart, world-famed aviator and the first woman to fly across the Atlantic Ocean as a passenger, approached the shores of the United States on her triumphant return home, she was handed this radiogram:
'Boston Zonta Club is proud to welcome you as a member.'
Signed Alice Bradley, President.

A few weeks later, she was inducted into Zonta International and served as an active member first in the Boston club and later in the New York club until her tragic and untimely disappearance in 1937. An outstanding woman with a charismatic personality, Earhart was universally admired around the world for her "wildly daring" but "never reckless" courage.

Amelia's Story.

(Our thanks to former Zontian Diane Williams who thoroughly researched the story of Amelia and composed this narration to celebrate the launching of the Zonta Amelia Earhart Young Pilot's Award in 2001.)

Hi there everybody. It sure is a pleasure to be here with you. Oh! I know, I know, you are all saying "Who is this woman?" Well, allow me to introduce myself and tell you about my life.

I am the spirit of Amelia Earhart. I was born on 24 July in Atchison, Kansas, U.S.A. The year was either 1897 or 1898—I guess we'll make it '98—after all, why be a year older than you need to be! My Momma—Amy Otis Earhart was the first woman who, at the age of 20 climbed to the top of Pike's Peak in Colorado—so I guess it's not too difficult to work out where at least some of my spirit of adventure comes from! My Daddy was a lawyer for the Rock Island Railroad—he worked settling claims which entailed a lot of travel. Momma accompanied him a lot, so my little sister Muriel and myself spent much of our childhood living with our maternal Grandparents, Judge and Mrs Otis in Atchison.

My Daddy had a weakness for alcohol—he neglected his work and consequently lost his job. Life was not all roses during my formative years, and due to many moves, economic difficulties and family illnesses, I became a bit of a loner, but this just proved to strengthen my spirit of independence. I left High School in 1915 and continued my studies at Women's Junior College in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Whilst on holiday in Toronto with my sister in 1917, and with the world at war, I decided not to return to studies and enrolled as a nurse's aide in the Red Cross. It was in Toronto that I used to watch stunt flyers and I took a course in engine mechanics.

In 1919 I attended Columbia University, New York to advance my Pre-Medical studies but by 1920 had reunited with my family in California, where Daddy had overcome his drinking problem. It was after attending an air show in Long Island Beach in 1922 that my interest in aviation really 'took off'. I contacted a local woman pilot who agreed to give me flying lessons.





Imagine my excitement when on my 24th birthday I bought my first plane—a second hand bright yellow Kinner Canary—and that same year 1922 set a new altitude record for women by flying to 14,000 feet.

In 1924, my parents divorced. I sold my yellow plane, bought a yellow sports car and moved with my mother and sister Muriel to Medford, Massachusetts. I worked in Boston part time, teaching English to foreign born children and spent free weekends at the nearest airfield.

In 1928 I became a Zontian and that same year I was the first woman to fly the Atlantic Ocean—as a passenger!! I was writing eight articles a year on aviation for Cosmopolitan and in a Zontian magazine wrote “It is up to women to get behind the aviation program—there is a great deal that women can do for aviation”.

1929 saw me competing in the ‘Powder Puff Derby’—the first cross country race for women. The race went from Santa Monica California to Cleveland Ohio. I came third and was elected first President of the 99’s—an association of women pilots named after the original 99 members.

By 1930, I was Vice-President of the New York, Philadelphia and Washington Airway Corporation and found New York a more convenient base for my business travels. There I became an active member of the Zonta Club of New York,

I also became involved in many business ventures, including piloting and promoting the new Autogrid—predecessor of the helicopter. On 7th February 1931, I married George Putnam—a publisher.



When I decided in 1932 to fly the Atlantic alone, I had my red Lockheed Vega overhauled and in May, after a 15 hour flight, landed in Londonderry, Ireland, making me the first woman to make a solo flight across the Atlantic Ocean. I was to receive many awards and honours including the U.S. Distinguished Flying Cross and the Zonta Trophy from my sister Zontians of New York,



I then achieved many solo firsts— 1935 Oakland, California—Honolulu, Hawaii, two international solo flights between California and Mexico City and Mexico City and New Jersey. My career took me along many paths, as lecturer, career counsellor to women, and even director of a dormitory in Lafayette, Indiana. I also became a designer of ‘attractive suitable clothes for active women’ — then luggage for plane travel.

I don’t even know myself when the idea for my round the world flight was formed but by 1937. I was ready to make the attempt. I took off in March but encountered delays in Hawaii due to bad weather and damage to the plane. Revising the flight plan— increasing my journey to 29,000 miles, the Lockheed Electra with Fred Noonan (my navigator) and myself left Miami, Florida on

01 June, the plan being to span the equator from East to West, ultimately reaching Howland Island in the Pacific.

One month and 22,000 miles later the plane was refueled for the longest and most hazardous part of the journey—2,500 miles over water to tiny Howland Island.

Radio signals were lost on 2nd July.....

I wrote a letter to my husband in 1937—in it I said

“Please know that I am quite aware of the hazards. I want to do it—because I want to do it. Women must try to do things as men have tried. When they fail, their failure must be but a challenge to others”.

I would like to thank Dr Laurie Georgeson for lending me this helmet and headgear.

I would like to finish with a poem from Amelia, written in 1928.

*“Courage is the price that life exacts
for granting peace.
The soul that knows it not,
knows no release from little things
knows not the livid loneliness of fear
nor mountain heights where bitter joy
can hear the sound of wings.
How can life grant us boon of living,
compensate for dull gray ugliness
and pregnant hate
unless we dare the soul’s dominion?
Each time we make a choice
we pay with courage
to behold resistless day and count it fair.”*

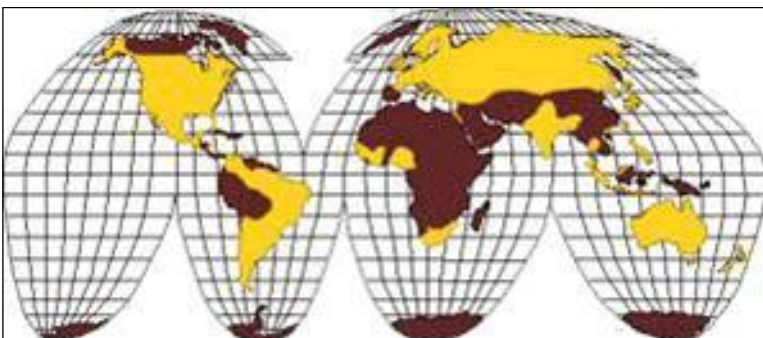
