In memory of Sheelagh Jane Hutton

25 November 1950 – 19 December 2013

In December 2013 the club mourned the passing of long-time member Sheelagh Hutton. Sheelagh will be remembered fondly in the club as an inspirational and driving force, a voice of reason and calm, and of course the person who always extracted premium fines from members when we played Zondarme. A Zontian who will be sorely missed and fondly remembered, Sheelagh epitomised the Zonta mission of empowering women through service, advocacy and education.

Below is an excerpt from Sheelagh's eulogy – given by her son Andrew Hough.

Sheelagh was a courageous and loving person who we all greatly admired. I just recently came across a quote from Elisabeth Kubler Ross that I think encapsulates her: *The most beautiful people we have known are those who have known defeat, known suffering, known loss, and have found their way out of the depths. These persons have an appreciation, a sensitivity, and an understanding of life that fills them with compassion, gentleness, and a deep loving concern. Beautiful people do not just happen.*

From early life to recent years, Mum's life was characterized by her courage in the face of such adversity, struggle against such odds, and her bright and beautiful smile she kept along the way.

Born in Belfast in 1950, she tragically lost her father to illness when she was very young. Despite this, she worked hard in school accomplishing academic and extra-curricular success, but she wasn't just a bookworm – Van Morrison himself once called her 'a very cool cat!' She graduated from Queens University in Belfast with majors in Education and Psychology and decided to travel the world. Around this time, she suffered another setback, sustaining major injuries in a car accident and having to spend a great deal of time learning to walk again. Unfortunately things didn't end there, tragedy was to strike her family again, taking her brother while he was in the prime of his life.

Unbowed, she married and left the foggy emerald isles for the sunshine and warmth of Queensland on a holiday and, immediately falling in love with this new country, decided to stay. Living in Calliope she gave birth to three sons, although



soon after went through a painful and lengthy divorce, and she was left to bring up her boys by herself. I remember how proud she was going back to full-time work, and she ended up devoting much of her professional life to teaching at Gladstone State High School. Every morning she was off before we woke up, with our lunches packed and breakfast ready, and home later that evening to prepare dinners for us. Now I don't understand how she managed this – I've been teaching for ten years and can't even look after myself! She managed to create a loving home, and bring up three boys all while managing a career. Three boys! Now, I'm no Dad (yet), but this sounds like a pretty amazing accomplishment to me.

Thankfully, as we gained increasing independence, Sheelagh was also able to start enjoying her own life as well. We've recently hear countless stories about travels to Europe, membership with Zonta, trips to the theatre, dinner and holidays with friends, as well as her friends in book club. WE thankn all those who have come into Mum's life and given her those rich rewards that she always deserved – we want you to know she often spoke of you all with fondness and heartfelt appreciation.

To all of us, Mum showed this uncanny ability to encourage us in our own times of adversity. When we felt lost in a dark pit of depression, self-doubt, or uncertainty, Mum would peer through the gloom and pick out something gleaming about your personality, your character, your attitudes, your achievements. She didn't judge you or hold you to your failures. She would light up your whole world, make you feel like a million bucks, like you could do anything! We could then leave home, go back to real life, renewed and ready to conquer the whole world! "The world is your oyster Andrew!" she would often say to me. That it is Mum, but only thanks to you.

So now you can see how Sheelagh was our home, our heart, our rock. Oliver Wendell Holmes once said, Where we love is home – home that our feet may leave, but not our heart. Now that Mum's heart is no longer beating, I feel like my home has disappeared too. Perhaps we can use use our memories of her to keep us going, encouraging us in times of adversity, and remembering to really enjoy life. I hope you too can take away some fond memories of Sheelagh today, whether it be

that bright smile of hers, a cheeky quip or two, a good conversation over a couple of glasses (or bottles!) of wine, an impossibly long recommended catch-up movie list, or even if she happened to put you in your place once in a while!

Please take away a fond memory, and help this incredible person live on, God knows she deserved it. She gave so much and was given so little, fighting against the odds for the benefit of others in her life, and single-handedly creating a warm and happy home we always wanted to come back to. She was a woman of courage, a woman of devotion tp friends and family, and a woman who also enjoyed some fine things in life.

To conclude, I would like to talk about journeys. In recdent days I've thought how all our lives are really characterised by journeys. Normally, it would be Mum sending her boys off at the airport right about now. Well, this time Mum I am afraid it is our turn to send you off on your grand journey. To help you on your way, I thought I would read an old Irish blessing which you once said to me:

May the road rise up to meet you. May the wind always be at your back. May the sun shine warm upon your face, the rains fall soft upon your fields, and, until we meet again, may God hold you in the palm of his hand.

Treasurers Report

I am pleased to present my financial report for the year ended 31 May 2014.

Firstly, sincere thanks go to all our members who have worked tirelessly at our many fundraising events to enable us to further the aims of Zonta. Your support is greatly appreciated. We are all working women and our time is precious. This makes it so special.

It has been increasingly hard to compete with other charity events in Gladstone. There is only a small proportion of the local population that can be relied upon to support our causes. Response has been amazing, however. The Movie Trivia night was a case in point. Building on the experience of the previous one, this one was well attended and raised a lot of money, considering the relatively small amount of guests. Total profits raised from this came to \$7,347.60 of which \$4,850.00 was donated to Roseberry Community Services, a well deserving local organisation.

The Zonta Stall at the annual Gladstone Multicultural Festival was well run, beautifully decorated and managed to do a brisk trade in cupcakes and other sweet delights. Although not strictly speaking a fundraising event, we managed to raise \$825.00 on the day.

For International Women's Day it was decided that, rather than compete against the many events happening around town, we would join AIM and support their event. We were a major partner and held a raffle to raise funds for the Gladstone Women's Health Centre. Total proceeds were \$1,016.75 of which \$675.00 were donated to GWHC.

Through our internal raffles at Dinner meetings, we managed to raise \$700.00 for a hospital in East Timor. Unfortunately owing to miscommunication about bank transfer details this donation has not yet taken place. Karen Ahrens, the local liaison for the organisation is trying to sort this out.

The Wine Club: \$400.00 was donated to the Samaritan's Purse. \$180.30 went towards the donation made in the name of Sheelagh Hutton to Interact at Gladstone SHS. Another \$300 was raised from a raffle held in her memory and the Club contributed another \$19.70 to bring the total donation to \$500.00.

Two scholarships were awarded, for Psychology and Law. Paul Grant and Chris Trevor and Associates each

contributed \$500.00 and the Club donated a further \$500 to each scholarship.

A more complete Profit and Loss sheet as well as a balance sheet will follow as our financial year is now ending on 31 May to align with the Zonta International year.

In order to save transfer fees and time input for the international transfers, Margaret and I had hoped to be able to register for internet banking but as we require 2 signatories the bank would not allow this.

This coming year will prove to be a challenge. Our projects are quite ambitious; starting with 2000 birthing kits to be assembled costing \$6000.00. We have already received a contribution of \$600.00 from Quota and are awaiting another contribution from Rotary. We have a very small member base this year and it will take a lot of dedication and drive to continue to serve the women in our region and the rest of the world. I am certain that we will achieve this.

A big focus too in the coming year will be the drawing up of a budget to assist the Club with careful management of all accounts. We should be striving to achieve a working ratio of between 1:1 and 2:1. This means that we would have current assets of \$2 for every \$1 of current liabilities or at least \$1 for every \$1, as suggested at the workshop regarding Governance of not-for-profit organisations presented by Rio Tinto in October.

Anyone willing to assist in the drawing up of the budget is very welcome.

Advocacy – Committee Chair Report

Throughout the past year, the Advocacy committee has worked tirelessly to further advance the work and profile of the Zonta Club of Gladstone. This year, we also undertook to actively advocate in our community for women and girls across the world as part of the Zonta Says No Campaign (ZSN). Although the club has actively advocated for Zonta and community initiatives in the past, this was the first time the Club has been an advocacy leader in our community. Congratulations ladies.

During the year we facilitated media coverage of our Educational Bursaries, our fantastic donation to SHINE at Gladstone State High School, as well as our Birthing Kit and Breast Cushion workshops in the Gladstone Observer, Gladstone News Weekly and in social media via the Club's Facebook page. This helped in promoting the great work the Club has done in the community as well as profiling the Club positively in the community.

This year we also developed a club Facebook page. The page's presence has grown stronger in social media with to date, over 180 likes meaning our posts reach hundreds of people. Thanks, Gail! Activity reports have indicated people respond really well to donations and result based activities that help those in the community, but we generally receive positive feedback and support from the community with all our communication.

I encourage all members who haven't already, to Like the page on Facebook and to share it with their Facebook friends. The more people who like the page, see the Club's messages and this creates a positive snowball effect.

The Club's Wine, Cheese and Facebook afternoon gave members the opportunity to enjoy fellowship as well as

learn more about Facebook, its benefits socially and from the Club's perspective. Organising a home page for another form of contact on the web has not yet eventuated however the Facebook page has been a solid start in introducing Zonta Gladstone to an engaged and eager audience.

The Club, especially Nat and Shyrelle had a lot of input in organising a successful Trivia Night held at Scotties again in September. It was also very successful raising funds for Roseberry Community Services.

The Gladstone Multicultural Festival was a resounding success, as all 250 cupcakes sold at our stall, which was beautifully decorated by members. It was a great opportunity to raise funds and also promote our Zonta Says No (ZSN) campaign where ZSN pins and ribbons were sold and where members engaged with community on the subject of Domestic Violence.

During White Ribbon Month and the ZSN campaign the club had guest speakers, sold White Ribbons on the 25th at the Ferry Terminal engaging with a large male community and attended Reclaim the Night. These were great advocacy opportunities within our community.

I look forward to continuing and expanding on the Club's Advocacy for advancing the status of Women and welcome to the new committee!

Danni has taken over the helm this year and is well on the way to preparing for a bigger and better workshop. Thanks to her's and Suzanne's efforts we received much needed donations from Rotary and Dr Bush towards the costs.

A wonderful Breast Cushion workshop: Diana Cameron and Di Malcolm were instrumental in making sure the breast cushion workshop went smoothly – input of other members is also recognised. (special thanks again to Suzanne and also to Heidi– and of course a huge thankyou to Kelly-Anne for doing the "behind the scenes" work).

A special mention to Phoebe and Danni for organising the wrapping workshop afterwards – and many thanks to all who helped out again there.

I am delighted to say Diana has taken on the responsibility to run it again this year and is well on track including adding some new ideas to make the packaging easier! Many thanks to Wendy who also put her hand up for this task initially.

Through Colleen's contacts and commitment we contacted the various service providers in our region with a view to collating an information brochure on Domestic Violence Services. We discovered that this excellent idea had already been taken up by someone else but, in the process, we made ourselves known to many services with the offer to assist in future. Colleen also showed her dedication to the cause by joining other members in the cold, dark dawn on white ribbon day.

Some of our committee members put their hands up to join last years' Trivia Night fundraiser which raised funds for Roseberry Community Services, who, among other things, provide crisis accommodation for women and children who are left homeless due to DV – this extends to young adults/late teens who find themselves without homes and family. Those same members have volunteered again this year and we are looking forward to another amazing evening.

We chose to support the AIM function rather than holding our own IWD event and raised much needed funds for Women's Heath Centre through the raffle, who provide, among other things, support for victims of sexual violence. Thanks again goes to Diana for arranging the major prize for that raffle and to the other individual members of our committee who went out of their way to provide assistance to AIM and ensure that our presence was felt at that event.

We ran our first Bursary event and were delighted to be able to financially assist 2 young ladies to commece tertiary studies outside of Gladstone. All committee members worked hard to raise donations towards that award and all committee members joined in the panel discussion in choosing our worthy recipients. We also contacted all of our local high schools to promote the Young Women in Current Affairs Award and were disappointed that no applicant's came forward. It will be a challenge for the new committee to generate interest in this award for this year.

We have taken on board the "hand bag suggestion" to collect hand bags with basic toiletry items to give to a DV service for women who find themselves removed from home in crisis situations – another project for our new committee to follow up on.

We also turned our minds to future fundraising opportunities and are very excited about our new concept of a Short Film Festival. (An idea which developed from a discussion which arose at the breast cushion wrapping workshop). Again members have rallied to arrange this event with another huge thanks to Danni, in particular.

I have enjoyed some very strong support from the members of my committee – and particularly, those whose names have been mentioned in this report. Their enthusiasm, dedication and commitment have made my role a breeze. It has also been a privilege to serve with one of our charter members, Di Malcolm and have the benefit of her experience.

We will particularly miss the commitment that Colleen has brought to the committee this last year and I highly commend her to the membership committee!

I happily pass the baton to Diana who is extremely dedicated, and I look forward to staying on and providing my assistance as a committee member of Service for the next year.

District Govenor's end of term letter to clubs

A 'thank you' message to the Zonta Clubs of District 22

When I was elected as District Governor and began to set goals for my biennium, I gave myself the challenge of visiting every Club in the District at least once, to ensure that every Zontian had the opportunity to hear about Zonta directly from a District and international perspective. After more than 50 Club meetings and events, two Leadership Workshops, eight Area Meetings, and a District Conference, I feel I have reached that goal and I want to thank you all for the warm welcome and the generous support you have extended to me in the process.

International President Lynn McKenzie's 'visibility and credibility' catchphrase for her biennium has resounded with us all, and every Zontian can be proud of the extent to which the *Zonta says NO* campaign was embraced as a means of making Zonta more visible in communities across the District, attracting interest not only in the issue of violence against women, but in membership of Zonta.

Amongst other achievements, the District has also taken a strong leadership role in advocacy. Thanks to Denise Conroy, submissions have been made on no fewer than seven issues affecting the status of women. We have also made an exceptional contribution to the growth of Z Clubs this biennium with one chartered by Charters Towers, and three by the Mackay Club. In addition, our Clubs continue to make and distribute Breast Care Cushions as a District project and to make an outstanding contribution to the Birthing Kit Foundation through assembling thousands of kits each year (27 of the 43 D22 clubs collectively made 32,800 kits this biennium) – all of that on top of making a very real difference to improving the status of women in our local communities.

The District can also take pride in the international success of our candidates in the programs directed at the next generation of women leaders (Young Women in Public Affairs Awards, Jane M. Klausman Scholarships and Amelia Earhart Fellowships) and in the exceptional financial contribution made to the Zonta International Foundation to support both those programs and Zonta International's service and ZISVAW programs. At 30 April, the cut-off date for contributions to be recognised at the Orlando Convention, this District had contributed USD\$232,024.99, making it the fourth most generous District in the Zonta world. Congratulations!

A second personal goal of my biennium was to strengthen communication and to consolidate the District administratively. The development and launch of a new District website was a critical part of this process as was adopting a practice of communicating with Club leaders through 'single issue' e-mails rather than newsletters. Area boundaries were changed to produce a more even distribution of Clubs, with Gympie moving from Area 1 to Area 2 and Brisbane River moving from Area 1 to Area 3, and the Zonta Clubs of Mt Isa Breakfast, Logan, Emerald and Tamborine Mountain, which were either inactive or at risk of failing to meet legal obligations, were supported in exiting from Zonta International with grace and pride, collectively contributing a legacy of more than \$5,700 to the Zonta International Foundation from the closure of their Clubs.

Another goal was to achieve greater sharing of resources and ideas – the orange T-shirts and District-specific ribbons produced for the *Zonta says NO* campaign were an excellent example of this, and many Clubs shared artwork and supplier details in order to produce a range of other merchandise. Similarly, a bulk purchase of copies of the 2012-2014 program edition of *The Zontian* magazine and of business cards printed with Zonta's QR code, gave Clubs a valuable resource to distribute to new and prospective members and to community leaders.

Collaboration among Clubs has been another outstanding feature of the biennium, particularly among the 18 Clubs within 100 km of Brisbane. The *Walk to say NO* with its accompanying website, and the joint fundraiser in support of the Salvation Army's *Project NOW* both earned a nomination for the inaugural Service Recognition Awards which will be announced at the 2014 Convention in Orlando.

Despite the closure of four Clubs, District 22 had 1082 members at the end of March 2014, only 17 fewer than at the end of the 2010-2012 biennium. This is testament to the highly successful recruitment undertaken by Clubs and, with a stronger focus on retention, continuation of the Zonta says NO campaign, and an inspiring suite of international service projects for the next biennium, I am confident that District membership will continue to grow over the next biennium under

the leadership of Judith Trevan-Hawke as District Governor, and Ans Van Erp as Lieutenant Governor and District Membership Chairman. I also hope to be able to play a direct role because the incoming International President, Maria Jose Landeira Østergård, has asked me to serve on the International Membership Committee – a challenge I am looking forward to.

Thank you again for all that you do and for making my term as Governor so satisfying and memorable.
