## Lou Xiaoying of China

he inspiring story of the Chinese rubbish collector who saved and raised more than 30 babies abandoned at the roadside. A woman has been hailed a hero after details of her astonishing work with abandoned children has emerged.

'I realised if we had strength enough to collect garbage how could we not recycle something as important as human lives ...'

y older children all help look after Zhang Qilin, he is very special to all of us. I named him after the Chinese word for rare and precious.

he whole thing started when I found the first baby, a little girl back in 1972 when I was out collecting rubbish. She was just lying amongst

the junk on the street, abandoned. She would have died had we not rescued her and taken her in. Watching her grow and become stronger gave us such happiness and I realised I had a real love of caring for children.

realised if we had strength enough to collect garbage how could we not recycle something as important as human lives,' she explained.

hese children need love and care. They are all precious human lives. I do not understand how people can leave such a vulnerable baby on the streets.'

ou Xiaoying, now 88 and suffering from kidney failure, found and raised more than 30 abandoned Chinese babies from the streets of Jinhua, in the eastern Zhejiang province where she managed to make a living by recycling rubbish.

he and her late husband Li Zin, who died 17 years ago, kept four of the children and passed the others onto friends and family to start new lives.

er youngest son Zhang Qilin - now aged just seven - was found in a dustbin by Lou when she was 82. 'Even though I was already getting old I could not simply ignore the baby and leave him to die in the trash. He looked so sweet and so needy. I had to take him home with me,' she said.

took him back to our home, which is a very small modest house in the countryside and nursed him to health. He is now a thriving little boy, who is happy and healthy.

#### CHINA'S ONE-CHILD POLICY

China's controversial 'policy of birth planning' was introduced in 1978 to reduce the strain on the country's burgeoning population and reduce the strain on resources.



It officially restricts married, urban couples to having one child and those who break the rules have to pay a fine or fee. Those who stick to the rules are usually awarded a certificate and can benefit financially, such as receiving an additional month's salary every year until the child turns 14.

The policy allows exemptions in some cases - including rural couples, couples without siblings on either side, and ethnic minorities. Certain rural parts of the country allow couples to have a second child if the first born is a girl **but many parents feel pressured to produce an heir and end up abandoning the females.** 

If the second child is also a girl, no more children are allowed. It is extremely rare to find a family that has two sons.

Despite the fact that it is illegal to kill newborn babies in the country, female infanticide and the failure to report female births is widely suspected, especially in rural areas. Despite this, an independent 2008 survey reported that 76 per cent of the Chinese population supported the policy.

My story: Our move to Mackay from Brisbane happened in December 2006. It was our "seachange", well my husband's – he became a B-double fuel tanker driver after 17 years as a Purchasing/Warehouse Manager – go figure! We bought our current house in October 2007 and then had 30cm of water through it in the February 2008 floods. The rain we'd had leading up to that time was the most my kids had ever seen in their entire life to date, so that morning will always remain in our memories.

I'm the youngest of five children to Frank & Dorothy Gooderham, from Jandowae, Queensland (west of Toowoomba). I became an aunt at the age of three, and my children are the last two of 14 grandchildren. I got my first camera at 13, a year after my father died from septicaemia. I loved taking photos and have more of my nieces and nephews than their parents do I'm sure. I wanted to marry for love and was prepared to wait until my soul mate entered into my life. I didn't think it would take nearly 30 years for this to happen, but happen it did, just when I'd decided that maybe it wasn't meant for me. Alister and I



met at a cocktail party 22<sup>nd</sup> June 1991 and were married 1<sup>st</sup> August 1992, on my 31<sup>st</sup> birthday. His choice, so he'd never forget, or he'd be in double trouble! We'd just built our first home and our finances were tight when he finally


popped the question, he'd known for 6 months I'd say 'yes' because I'd told him so! So I had 6 weeks to plan our wedding and honeymoon on a \$500 budget – I'm very proud to say I did it!

**Career highlights:** My career started in building societies as a cashier and spanned about 10 years before I started doing temp work, which always ended up with a job offer. I also worked with Tourism Queensland until I had Matthew. When Tayla was a baby I was introduced to Creative Memories and because of my love of photos, I saw this as something that would work for me. I wanted to tell everyone about Creative Memories and help them make an informed decision about how they stored their photos and how they could tell their stories to pass on for generations to come. That was 12 years ago now and I love being able to earn an income doing something I love! It's the longest thing I've stuck with outside marriage and motherhood!
