Zonta on the Rocks - Advancing the Status of Women Worldwide

The article below is taken from the Zonta International Website and is the story of a Zontian who was and who still will be after her death, an inspiration not only to all Zontians, but to all women.

Josephine G. Cooke (1931-2008) Zonta International President 1996-1998

"Women's rights are human rights. We, the members of Zonta International, understand that now that we have broken the silence, we must break the cycle."

Past International President (1996-1998) Josephine G. "Josie" Cooke's words are as inspiring today as when she spoke them at a 1998 conference. Josie died 4 March 2008 at the age of 76.

A native of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania (USA), Josie was born 5 May 1931 and at the age of three was diagnosed with rheumatic fever. She was unable to attend school for much of her childhood, but graduated with her class in 1948. She attended Virginia University in Richmond, VA but was diagnosed with sickle-cell anemia at the age of 19 and returned to Philadelphia. Josie was told her life expectancy was 30 years, but with her characteristic tenacity and optimism, she pursued her education and a full family and professional life, despite an illness that was often painful and debilitating.



Josie began her career teaching functionally illiterate adults. In 1967, after moving to southern California, she began a second career in the mortgage banking industry. In 1990, Josie and a partner organized C & L Mortgage Services, Inc., providing consultative training and regulatory compliance audit services to mortgage lenders.



Josie joined the Zonta Club of Los Angeles in 1976. "For me, the appeal of Zonta was its Amelia Earhart Fellowship (to provide scholarships to young women pursuing careers in aviation and aeronautics), but I knew nothing about the Zonta organization in general. And when I learned about what they were doing for women in areas of education, I thought, 'Oh, great! This is a good thing to do.'"(1) A year after joining, she was elected President of the Club. She went on to serve as area director, lieutenant governor and district governor, and then as International director, vice president and president-elect.

During her service as Zonta International President (1996-1998), Josie opened the country of South Africa to Zonta. "I had the opportunity...to visit South Africa in 1996 and found a country with wonderful resources wealthy and yet stricken with poverty, crime, segregation, and discrimination. Unbelievable."

She was instrumental in the formalization of the Zonta International Strategies to Prevent Violence Against Women (ZISVAW) Program to reduce the incidence of violence against women and girls by supporting prevention and advocacy strategies. "I was so very pleased at the end of my term [as Zonta International president] the board recommended that ZISVAW should be an ongoing international project ... It's a beginning. ZISVAW. I would like to see the day come when ZISVAW is no longer needed. That's the goal."(2)

In addition to her deep commitment to Zonta activities over 32 years of membership, Josie was actively involved in her church, her community and other industry organizations. She was an activist and Board member of the Sickle Cell Disease Foundation of California. She was also active in Volunteers in Aid of Sickle Cell Anemia and Delta Sigma Theta Sorority.

She was a lover of music and an accomplished singer, sharing her joy even in the face of many personal challenges.

"Josie was a positive bright light, a determined woman, an extraordinarily wise lady, and a great inspiration to me and to many," said Zonta International Executive Director Janet Halstead.



In 2007, author and founder of Documentary Arts Alan Govenar, himself a member of the Zonta Club of Dallas, included his 2004 interview with Josie in his book, Untold Glory: African Americans in Pursuit of Freedom, Opportunity, and Achievement. Josie said, "I guess I've had the pleasure of having more positive results than negative results ... there's an old religious song that we sing, 'I've had some good days, I've had some bad days - Hills to Climb. I've had some lonely days, I've had some sleepless nights, but when I look around and I think it over, all of my good days outweigh my bad days.' If it doesn't go right, I turn around and make another path ... I know I have to do something with the rest of my life. And I don't know what that is; I don't know what that purpose is. But I look at all opportunities as a purpose, as a purpose for me, to do something good for somebody else. That's what I do with my life." (3)

Josie's daughter, Tracey Harris, is a member of the Zonta Club of Los Angeles. Josie's family has requested memorial contributions to the Zonta International Foundation be directed to the ZISVAW Fund.
