

Silent Auction during Conference Dinner - Denise Conroy

Our District Governor, Trish Collins, has accepted my offer to organize a Silent Auction to be held at the same time as the Conference Dinner at our Annual Conference on 23-25 September next. All funds raised will go towards the District's contribution to the Zonta International Foundation for international projects.

I'm sure, in fact I know, that there are many talented Zontians in club land. What would be great is if those so talented would donate something for the Silent Auction as I am sure this would provide a wide range of creative items which would be highly sought after – especially if they have been produced by our valued members. We also need items which come from each club's local area so that members from that area can bid on these. Such things as restaurant vouchers, beauty salon vouchers, a will or Advanced Health Directive/ Enduring Power of Attorney (donated by a solicitor), interior design concept, financial advice, eye examination etc. from a variety of professionals.

Some members who own holiday properties might consider donating a two night holiday, for example. Those who live on a farm might consider a 'farm stay'. Who knows, you might get help with the chores! Others who own businesses may care to donate goods/products or services. Clubs which have 'products' might like to donate these. The possibilities are endless. The items are not required until Friday 23 September, but if you want to send them earlier then that can be arranged.

I would be grateful if you could send this email to all club members and discuss at your next meeting what items you might contribute. The range of items in terms of size and value is what makes a good Silent auction. I remember at a previous auction that a Commonwealth Bank 'vintage' money box went for \$45. A tin box!!! But a collector's item.

I would also appreciate it if you could indicate what donations you have organized by 20 May. This is NOT a cut-off date, but one where I can send out a summary before I go overseas on 25 May. I will continue to pick up emails whilst I am away but not as frequently as I would here. I will return on 29 June so will then have time to collect any donations if you wish to hand them over prior to 23 September.

If you are gathering vouchers, please remember that the Conference is on 23-25 September so those who bid on them will be using them after that date. If there are restrictions on when items can be used or an expiry date, it would be helpful to have that stated in a letter from the donor.

It is my hope that this Auction might attract additional attendees to the dinner on 24 September. It is a reasonably unobtrusive event as one can just keep checking on the item(s) they are bidding on. I will produce a list of items ahead of the Conference so that you will have some idea of what is on offer but you will need to attend the dinner in order to make a bid.

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NORMA WEST—PROFILE.

I was flattered to be invited to join the first Zonta Club in Rockhampton in 1983, and appreciated the opportunity to meet with women from such different and diverse professions and businesses to my own Nursing Profession.

I began my journey with Zonta in the role of Charter Minute Secretary. I have subsequently held the position of President, and have been Chairman of committees over the years, including the nominating committee, resisting at all times the role of Treasurer.

The year after joining Zonta, Sydney hosted the first Zonta Convention outside of America. I attended, and I have since attended Conventions in Toronto, Hong Kong, Hawaii, Melbourne and Rotterdam, as well as most Conferences and Workshops in Australia since. It is the reinforcement in the original belief, gained by the above attendances that allows me to want to continue to be in Zonta.

So who am I?

I was born in Proserpine, the fourth child of six (three boys and three girls) and the middle daughter. (middle children have it hard). My three brothers are deceased. My sisters live in Brisbane and Perth, and we endeavour to meet at least once a year. My schooling was to Junior level, and when the opportunity arose, I completed Senior subjects after moving to Rockhampton.

My first job was as a Stenographer for a Solicitor in Proserpine for 12 months, then as a Stenographer for a Company selling Earth Moving equipment in Townsville. (Actually my first paying job was delivering ice blocks in my little cart for the ice chests of a few neighbours.)

Nursing had always been the goal, and when eligible, I commenced the four year general training course in Bundaberg. (I still meet up with friends from that first year on a regular basis, and we are off on a Pacific Cruise this year.) Midwifery at the Queen Alexandra Maternity Hospital in Hobart followed. I loved this field of nursing.

As A DC Sister, I worked first at my training Hospital the Queen Alex, then a Private Hospital in Adelaide, and then home to Proserpine for a year at the Local Hospital. From Proserpine I went to Monto and after two years as a DC Sister on staff there, I was persuaded to take on the role as Matron. I held this role for two years, when I left to obtain the Maternal and Child Welfare Certificate.

With the Maternal and Child Welfare completed, I worked first in the Baby Clinic in Mackay travelling to Sarina and St Lawrence to conduct Clinics, Sarina by car, and St Lawrence by train. And then Mt Isa which included by plane, visits to Cloncurry and Camoweel. Cloncurry in a DC 3 and Camoweel in a Fokker. (Married women were not permitted to do M& CW at that time.)

I enjoyed the Clinics, but preferred a variety of experiences offered by the smaller hospital and accepted a position as Matron of the Longreach Hospital. I was at Longreach for 7 years except for a year I took off to undertake the Diploma in Nursing Administration Course at the College of Nursing in Brisbane. (This was the only post grad courses open to nurses at that time). While in Longreach, I was one of the few invited to have lunch with the Queen.

With the added qualification of Nursing Administration, I accepted the Matron's position at the Rockhampton Base Hospital, and took up this position in 1971 and with title changes to first Nursing Superintendent, then Director of Nursing and finally Executive Director of Nursing, I retired from this position in 2001. As an external student while at Rockhampton Base Hospital I obtained a Graduate Diploma in Management at the Central Queensland University.

Since leaving the work place, apart from all that Zonta has to offer, I am involved with Meals on Wheels, ADFAS, The St Luke's Church, AIR (Independent Retirees), President of the ACHHA, Chairman of the International Nurses Day Celebrations, and am a member of U3A, (including 3 years as President of U3A.) Through the U3A, I belong to groups such as Astronomy, Tai Chi, Mah Jong, Speaking, "cooking", Armchair Travel. I attend Curves Gym four or five times a week, and walk one or twice a week. Apart from the rewards offered by being in such a profession as Nursing, I received the Imperial Award of OBE in 1983, and in 2010 I was made a Companion of the University by CQUniversity, and received the Living Treasure Award from the Rockhampton Zonta Club. Also in 2010, I was honoured in the Rockhampton Regional Council publication "Leading with Grace and Strength" "Stories of Women in Central Queensland".

I continue to enjoy my involvement with the Rockhampton Zonta Club, and have watched with interest the Clubs changes in emphasis and direction, depending on the skills and interests of the membership, while at all times the Clubs has focused on Zonta's ideals.
