


Soon, we will be celebrating Easter, so let me start by wishing all Zontians, your loved ones and your clubs a Happy Easter.

Membership - Lt. Gov. Sandy Venn-Brown

As I write this I have already attended the Area 1 and 3 Meeting in Maleny. It was a great event and the Membership workshop I ran was well patronised. Thanks to everyone.

In April Zonta International will be launched the **Global Membership Drive (GMD)** where we are hoping to not only attract more members around the world but also provide make membership more meaningful for those existing members. As I have said for some time - it's not good enough to bring new people into our clubs if we are losing the same number.

There are a number of reasons members leave us, but it's great if they go on to become a "Zonta friend" - they stay in touch, attend our functions, advocate for our cause; and encourage others to join even though they cannot. At Area Meetings we will explore the two types of resignations - natural attrition and problem resignations. We have little control over the natural attrition of our members - we can't stop a person's transfer to another town for work. But do have a lot of control over problem resignations.

A major component of the GMD will be some practical tools and promotional materials clubs can use to rejuvenate membership as well as help in attracting new members. And, following the Area Meetings I will be circulating some tips and tricks to minimising our problem resignations. As well with the help of the District Membership Committee we will be developing some tools for membership retention.



\$\$\$\$ Money, money money....WHERE DOES YOUR ZONTA MONEY GO?

Many of us Zontians are often confused as to where our hard earned money goes, with good reason. There are many components to the Zonta International Foundation.

International Service Programs: There are currently 4 of these, of which you are probably quite aware: Obstetric Fistula, Let Us Learn Madagascar, HIV & Gender based violence, Gender Responsive Schools. Since 1923, Zonta has provided nearly US\$15.5 million to projects benefiting women in 37 countries. Have a read of these programs on the International site...they truly will make you proud of what YOU have helped achieved.

<u>Educational Programs</u>: Three of these: Women in Aerospace, Women in Business and Young Women in Public Affairs. Again, pretty self explanatory and I believe almost all clubs support one or more of their local girls every year. It's simply all about educating women in what may have been considered 'male' occupations in 'olden' times!

ZISWAW Program: Abit more complicated than the other two perhaps: Just the abbreviation causes angst but, again, not too difficult: ZONTA INTERNATIONAL STRATEGIES TO ERADICATE VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN AND CHILDREN (ZISVAW) GRANTS HISTORY, 1996-2016. That pretty much says it all! Since the program's inception in 1999, more than US\$5.5 million has been provided to support projects to prevent and end violence against women and girls in 42 countries. Rose Fund: Zontians can make donations to the Rose Fund to show their appreciation for a woman whom they admire or want to honour. Clubs can also choose to send funds to the Rose Fund as is used as 'top-up' fund that enables Zonta to continue supporting projects and programs area should there be a (financial) short-fall. Similar to all Zonta funds, the Rose Fund helps women to achieve a life free of violence and empowerment to overcome gender barriers that hinder access to health, education and professional resources.

CENTENNIAL ENDOWMENT CAMPAIGN: WHAT IS AN ENDOWMENT FUND?

A financial endowment is a donation of money or property to a not-for-profit organization for the ongoing support of that organization. In an endowment fund, the principal amount is kept intact in an investment account while the investment income is available for use. Today the Foundation has two separate endowment funds: a general Endowment Fund and the Amelia Earhart Endowment Fund. This all means that you can leave a legacy to Zonta! It can be a one off or a continuing set amount. You can leave a lot or a little in your will for Zonta too! The difference is that the principal of an endowment fund is not spent; only the interest from this investment is used to support programs and projects. This kind of giving assures Zonta will have the critically needed assets to provide strong and vibrant service

I truly hope this helps a little to explain where your hard earned money goes and encourages you to give freely with a warm heart, knowing EXACTLY how it is spent! PJ Halter, Communications

It may include influencing laws, legislation or attitudes. **Zonta advocacy** is an action taken in "the public interest" or for "the greater good" with respect to empowering women and girls and advancing their human rights.

Clubs must not contact any federal or state organisation or parliamentarian directly, with regard to any Zonta Advocacy matter. Due process and protocol need to be adhered to, that is contact is to be made initially with the District Governor, with a copy to the District Advocacy Chairman, before communicating with any politicians.

Zonta celebrates contribution of Muslim women at International Women's Day event

With an early start on Tuesday 7 March 2017, over 200 women (and some brave men) attended an International Women's Day breakfast hosted by the Zonta Club of Brisbane River.

With the amount of public phobia which has been directed in recent times to Muslims and often to the way Muslim women dress as a manifestation of their faith, The Zonta Club of Brisbane River hosted this event to address myths and facts about Muslim women, to celebrate the many and varied contributions Muslim make to our community, and to change the conversations. How we stand together with women from many communities, countries and faiths is a mark of the Zonta community. Guest speakers on the day were two Muslim women from very different backgrounds and experiences Yasmin Khan and Homa Forotan.

Yasmin is both 5th generation Australian (on her father's side) and 1st generation Australian (on her mother's side) growing up in Innisfail, her family still mostly reside in North Queensland. She is a community activist with a background both in broadcasting and small business. She currently runs a DV support service for women from Muslim cultures and women from the Indian sub-continent. She established Eidfest, now the biggest Muslim gathering in Queensland which celebrates the end of Ramadan. Yasmin is currently the Chair of ECCQ - Ethnic Communities Council of Queensland, and was the President of the Islamic Women's Association of Queensland for a number of years.

Her voluntary contributions has seen her recognised with a number of prestigious awards including the Australian Muslim Achievement Award, Queensland Multicultural Ambassador and most recently she was named the Queensland Local Hero as part of the 2017 Australia Day Awards. Yasmin outlined how her religion is just part of who she is, and how it epitomises her commitment to family, culture and community.

Homa had a very different start to life. A former Afghan refugee, Homa is now Brisbane based doctor. She fled Afghanistan via Pakistan as a young girl and arrived in Australia 10 years later. Homa attended school in Queensland, being the first refugee to obtain an OP1, she has now finished medical school and is working at the Mater Hospital. Homa was the 2008 Young Queenslander of the Year and views Afghanistan as her homeland and Brisbane as the place where her dreams come true. Homa shared her appreciation of her religion, how she enjoys the cultural aspects, poetry, music, art and most importantly how it enriches her spiritually.

The event was attended by several other Zonta Clubs, and sponsorship from Queensland Government enabled local schools and community organisations to be invited. The event was also supported by YWCA, MDA Ltd, and the Ethnic Communities Council of Queensland.

The Zonta Club of Brisbane River continued the theme of Celebrating Muslim Women through a social media campaign throughout Queensland Women's Week. The campaign highlighted the contributions of 12 Muslim women as well as publishing a myth busting statements about women and Islam.
