Observing Namibia Day 26th August

Where is Namibia? It's a country in southern Africa with borders on Angola in the north, Botswana in the East and South Africa in the south. Poor rainfall limits agriculture to livestock raising. Fishing, millet, maize and wheat are also important. Exports are dominated by uranium and diamonds. The economy has not recovered from the devastation of the war for independence, and is still highly dependent on South Africa and multinational companies.

Listory: Namibia was occupied by Khoikhoi (Hottentot), San (Bushman) and Herero peoples when Portuguese navigators exploited the coastal areas of the country in the late 15 century. German missionaries went there in the 19th century and in 1884 the German protectorate of South-West Africa was established. In 1915, during World War 1, it was captured by South African forces, and in 1920 became a LEAGUE OF NATIONS mandated territory under South Africa. In 1946 the UNITED NATIONS refused to allow it to be incorporated into South Africa and ended the mandate (1964) renaming the territory Namibia. In 1971 the International Court of Justice at The Hague ruled that the continued occupation of Namibia by South Africa was illegal and the UN recognised the Black Nationalist group SWAPO (South West Africa People's Org) as the legitimate representative of the people of Namibia. A National Assembly for internal government was established by South Africa in 1979 but SWAPO guerrillas continued to operate from Angola, which South African troops invaded. In 1988 South Africa was persuaded by the UN to negotiate with the SWAPO leader Samuel Nujoma. A Geneva protocol was signed in August and SWAPO won elections in November 1989 with Nujoma becoming President.

Namibia gained independence as a multiparty democracy in 1990.

Past International President Chief 'Folake Solanke SAN celebrated her 75th Birthday on Wednesday and Thursday 28 and 29 March 2007 in grand style with the release of her Autobiography "Reaching for the Stars". Wednesday saw the launch of her autobiography at an event attended by more than 1,000 well wishes. Professor 'Wole Soyinka, the first African Nobel Laureate in Literature (and the only Nobel Prize winner in Nigeria) delivered the 'birthday lecture'. The following day (Folake's actual birthday) there was a special thanksgiving service and reception for nearly 2,000 guests.

'Folake is a woman of many "firsts".....

1st woman State Commissioner in the Western State of Nigeria, 1972. 1st Woman Chairman of the Board of WNTV and WNBS, 1972. 1st Woman Senior Advocate of Nigeria, 1981. 1st Gov of Zonta International District 18 (Africa), 1982. 1st Female Life Patron of the Nigerian Bar Association, Ibadan Branch.

At the moment the organisation is focusing on economic self -sufficiency, education and health and overcoming poverty and HIV/AIDS.

TALK on Burma at Breakfast

Please picture 8 of us, listening to the most awesome tales of this UN declared country of "Least Developed Nation Status," while we watched the sun rise above the most magical sea of ours in the Whitsundays, tucking into our coffee and generous servings of breakfast.

Robyn Mitchell, our new Vice President, showed us during her masterful and beautifully illustrated speech, how the people of Burma, now Myanmar, were trying to make sense of the worst run and most repressive regime of any country you wish to name.

 $\mathbf G$ urma is bankrupt. It is forced to be insular. Only a hobbled underground opposition is keeping up the hopes of the general people, and it is inspired by Aung San Suu Kyi, who's "National League for Democracy" won 80% of the vote. She is kept contantly under house arrest and relies on her followers for her life. The Military regime is adding to it's cruel history of torture and widely reported killing of students and other dissidents. It restricts it's people to set areas of mobility, places constant and exorbitant taxes on petrol which effectively cuts down motorized vehicles on the struggling, uneconomic farms. Manual labour is the only alternative to starvation. Communication with the outside world is stifled. We learnt that Mobile phones cost \$5,000, TV broadcasts are scrambled. Hot mail is banned. The World Bank is refusing to give loans to Burma because it could not be trusted to use the money as it was intended. Why should this happen to a beautiful green land almost "girt by sea". These charming people used to export millions of tons of rice products to other Asian countries. Trafficking in children and forced labour is rife. Torture is endemic. The Black Market is government backed with the Army owning hotels and fuel

What can we do as Zontians? Giving directly to the people through their schools and letting the world know the plight of the Burmese who deserve to have their voting rights restored.

Swimming champ Linda McGill

The first woman (an Aussie) to swim the English Channel, has sold her swimming medals to pay for cancer related surgery. The medals went up for auction in July and were sold to the National Maritime Museum.

Linda had a massively successful marathon swimming career and won gold medals at the Commonwealth Games and at the 1964 Tokyo Olympics alongside fellow swimming champ Dawn Fraser. It's a shame that Linda has had to sell her swimming medals, but she says "she is happy to have them on display for all the public to appreciate."

Many of you will remember Linda as Keynote Speaker at our International Women's Day Breakfast in 2003. She is a beautiful person and enchanted us with her stories. Almost two years ago, Linda was told she had malignant skin cancer on her nose. She's had 5 operations and has 4 to go to rebuild her nose. Such courage and determination.

We will never forget the look on Linda's face when *President Annie introduced Elvira Popontopofus* (alias Elva Paterson, a former Zontian). She broke into peals of laughter. Zonta Members will remember first seeing the shock of Elva *in a swimsuit with black hair sprouting everywhere!!* The sheer amazement of her outrageous caricature of we women hit us full on. Surviving breast cancer

Each year in Australia approximately 13,000 women are diagnosed with breast cancer. Although it can affect women at any age, three out of every four women diagnosed are aged over 50 years. Breast cancer can also develop in men, although this is rare. While we don't know what causes breast cancer or how to prevent it, we do know that your chances of developing the disease increase as you grow older.

Knowing your body could save your life

A recent survey by the National Breast Cancer Centre found many Australian women are putting their health at risk by ignoring the early warning signs of the disease. Finding breast cancer early, before it has spread to other parts of your body, is the best way to survive the disease.

Pam Bell, a 72-year-old from Sydney, is living proof of this important message. Pam found a lump in her breast nine years ago, which was diagnosed as breast cancer. After treatment for the disease Pam is now fitter and healthier than ever, but she believes one thing really saved her life. "If I had not seen my GP as soon as I noticed the lump, it could have been a very different story for me,' said Pam. Pam's quick action meant her breast cancer was diagnosed early and treated successfully. Pam now lives a full and active life and is a keen dragon boat paddler with the Dragons Abreast team – she has even represented Australia in the sport.



Pooter Pointers:

Photo Editing

Nearly all of us own and use digital cameras now, and we enjoy their benefits over the old film cameras. One really great thing is that with them, using your computer and a photo editing program, you can do so much more with them that formerly could only be done in a photo processing shop, for example, resizing, cutting out unwanted objects or people, improving exposure, removing redeye, and tons of "cool effects".

So do you have a photo editing program to do this? Here are some suggestions, from cheapest/simplest to more expensive/complex:

- 1. Picasa: this is free and downloadable from the Google site at: http://picasa.google.com.au It can do the basic editing mentioned above but its "cool effects" are limited.
- 2. ACDSee: I mention this one because it's very easy to use and has more advanced editing options than Picasa. You can download it from

http://store.acdsee.com/store/acd/Content/pbPage.AU_bundle and it will cost you \$65 for the Photo Editor or bundled with the Photo Manager, \$109.

- 3. Ulead PhotoImpact v12 at \$200 and Zoner PhotoStudio v9 at \$100 are both available over the counter from Harvey Norman. I haven't used either but I believe that they will do a similar job to ACDSee.
- 4. Adobe Photoshop Elements: This is the simplified version of Adobe Photoshop the industry standard photo editor. Harvey Norman sells it for \$219. PJ uses it so feel free to ask her what she thinks of it.

Whichever photo editor you choose, do play around with it and discover what it can do. Every time you use it you should discover something new, exciting and satisfying.

Emailing photos

Oh and by the way, for sending those huge digital photo files, like 1mb, via email *please pretty please don't send these before you reduce their size!* Even without a photo editor you can do this easily in Windows XP, like this: 1. In its folder select any photo but don't open it. 2. With the photo selected you should see in the left hand menu under File and Folder Tasks an option "E-mail this file" 3. Click this and a box appears asking you if you wish to make your pictures smaller which you click OK to 4. This opens your email program with you photo(s) already attached to a new message.

JAKARTA

Where do I start? If you've never been to Jakarta, Indonesia's capital, imagine a polluted and traffic-jammed city, with a population of nearly 10 million and growing rapidly. An Australian I met at the airport and who travels regularly to Indonesia on business told me that in the next six months 20 new shopping malls are planned to be built in Jakarta. I really don't know if he was exaggerating but I'm sure you get his drift. Essentially though, Jakarta is a city of contrasts, mixing the ancient with the brand spanking new, the hip modern with the suffocatingly traditional and excessive wealth with hopeless poverty, as well as supporting a rapidly growing middle class of home and car owners.

I've chosen to show you just one photo from the many I took when I was there this past month of June... and I've resisted the temptation to make it a photo of either of my two grandchildren! The photo below shows my daughter-in-law, Piday, with her sister and brother and some of her nieces and nephews. Piday is on the right and her sister is on the left. I chose this photo to show how differently the two women dress in this present-day Indonesia. Both are Muslims. Piday dresses in modern western-style clothes, as do so many Indonesian Muslim women. Her sister is wearing the jilbab, the traditional Indonesian Muslim dress covering her head, neck, arms, body and legs, as do so many Indonesian Muslim women as well. Her sister dresses this way, not from any legal requirement, but because her conscience instructs her to do so and because her husband, who is conservatively religious, encourages her to do so.
