Recently Christina agreed to be our UN Committee chair which is fabulous news and she too will be giving a series of talks to members starting at our October meeting. She has a great passion for the subject and I am sure we will all learn a lot from her.

Recently the members voted to increase the cost of our dinner meetings to \$30 pp. Our efficient treasurer Lise had noted that our previous fee did not always cover costs depending on attendance. We have 39 members but usually there are only about 24-27 members at the meetings. We need 27 members at \$30 to cut even on cost of the meal and hire of the room. ADVOCACY

Just something to ponder:

"One woman dies in Australia every week at the hands of a partner or ex-partner"

Some say that it is more like 1.5 every week-- 6 per month.

Is the Zonta Says No campaign working? Is any campaign dealing with violence against women and children working?

Over the weekend I have read reports that indicate that domestic violence in Australia is at epidemic proportions. Natasha Stott Despoja says that it is a national disgrace. But is it worse than it was in years past? Or is it that women ARE speaking up? Is it like the incidences of Child Abuse in Institutions? People are ready and able to speak up because someone is at last listening. Women have long suffered domestic violence with the thought that there was nowhere for them to go. How would they support themselves and their children? Who was going to believe them? They mostly felt trapped. Is it any different today? Yes, there are places for women to go and there is support. But women still feel stigmatised --- they still feel embarrassed and ashamed, sometimes just unable to admit that they are victims of domestic violence. And so the wheel keeps turning.

Then there are the women like Kelly Thompson. She did report her abusive partner, Wayne Wood, no less than 34 times in the weeks leading up to her death-- including 9 times in one day. Her neighbours rang police expressing their fear. They were told to ring back if they heard screaming or breaking glass!! They didn't hear screaming or breaking glass but still Kelly Thompson died at the hands of her abusive partner. She had an AVO-- it proved useless to Kelly.

Because of his findings in the case of Kate Malonyay-- murdered by her ex-partner, the deputy Coroner in NSW will recommend that the Education minister in NSW introduce a topic dealing with domestic violence and abusive relationships into the school curriculum. It is interesting that in both the cases that I have mentioned, the perpetrator has killed himself as well.

It is with great interest that I wait to see if the committee being organised and including Dame Quentin Bryce can make inroads into this vexing issue. She has been made an honorary Zontian. Maybe, just maybe, she and others like her can make a difference.

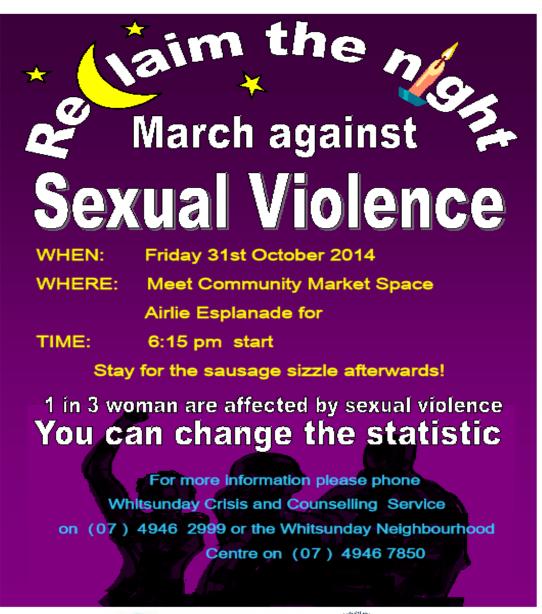

Female genital mutilation: unfortunately a subject that is current even in Australia.

What is FGM?

The World Health Organization (WHO)

states that the term female genital mutilation (FGM) refers to all procedures involving partial or total removal of the external genitalia or other injury to the female genital organs for non-medical reasons. FGM is a harmful practice and a violation of human rights of affected women and girls. In 1997, the WHO issued a joint statement with the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) and the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) against the practice of FGM.

Also known as 'female circumcision' or 'female genital cutting', FGM is deeply entrenched in cultural and societal meanings and beliefs. FGM is considered a normal and necessary aspect of raising a girl properly in preparation for adulthood and marriage in many cultures.

In Australia, it is illegal to practice FGM. New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, Australian Capital Territory and Northern Territory have legislated against the practice of FGM and it exists in the Criminal Codes of Western Australia and Tasmania. There is no federal legislation regarding FGM.

FGM in Australia

Over the past decades, through migration and refugee flight, women and girls who have been subjected to FGM have resettled in western countries, including Australia.

In 2011, there were 109,000 people living in Australia who were born in countries that practice FGM. It is difficult to know the precise number of women and girls in Australia who are affected by FGM.

It is important that national, state and territory health and community service providers and planners are aware of FGM in order to care for the special needs of women and girls affected by FGM.

Reversal of genital mutilation in Australia

There are several clinics that are specialized in pelvic health for women, including the reversal of genital mutilation. The Pelvic Health Unit in Pimlico, North Queensland (femalepelvichealth.com.au), is a comprehensive multidisciplinary service aimed at addressing issues of bowel and bladder incontinence, genital prolapse and sexuality. About a quarter of all women suffer from embarrassing leakage of bowel or bladder. Most women suffer silently and wait for years before seeking help, thereby suffering social isolation, depression and even marital discordance. One in five women suffers from genital prolapse resulting in bladder problems, bowel problems or sexual dysfunction. The Pelvic Health Unit is at the forefront in research and treatment of these debilitating conditions and offers comprehensive, compassionate and minimally invasive therapies for their ailments. Prof Rane's unit provides the only sub-specialist urogynaecology service in regional Australia, North Queensland in particular. Prof. Rane was a finalist for Queensland Australian of the Year 2012 and was awarded the Order of Australia Medal in 2013.

Female genital mutilation all over the world cannot be fought successfully with legislation only, as long as it is deeply entrenched in religion and culture. Only education of the men and women involved can decrease and finally end this brutal practice.

This month we are reading "The Blind Man's Garden" by Nadeem Aslam. Given current events, this book could not be more topical as it is set in Pakistan and Afghanistan during the war that followed the 9/11 attacks on the United States. We are given a perspective on these events, on life in Pakistan and the influence of Islam from the inside when Jeo and Mikal, foster brothers from a small Pakistani town, secretly enter Afghanistan with the intent of caring for wounded civilians. Their intentions are soon frustrated however as they are betrayed by Afghanis they believed would help them and captured and tortured by the Americans believing them to be members of al-Qeada. One thing I find particularly poignant is the inside perspective we are given from the women involved of life and events in Pakistan.

THE ZONTA LIBRARY PROJECT:

This project began as a proposal for a Partnership between the Whitsunday Library and this Zonta Club. It was proposed that Zonta contribute \$1000 per year for five years to assist the library in building a collection of books that would empower women by educating them in life skills, technology and provide information to guide them professionally, physically and aid in maintaining mental wellness.



The first year's purchases related to personal development including returning to work, professional presentation financial education and technology (such as Windows for Dummies)

Year two had a health focus including talks by Cydney O'Meara and purchase of numerous references on healthful food choices and preparation.

The third year books, DVDs and multimedia relating to families, children and life choices were purchased.

All the material purchased was clearly labelled with a Zonta bookplate and carried the Zonta logo on the spine of books.

The project halted for some time whilst the committee regrouped and finally this year in 2014 the final stage was purchased. Seven sets of ten novels were purchased for the Whitsunday library to process and hold as sets to be used by Book club groups. The concept being that book clubs are a way of women getting together in friendship and discussion. The novels selected are current and many have been made into films thus enticing readers to share the same story in two modes

These sets too, have beautiful bookplates set inside the cover which kindly designed for us by Catherine Bowers.

The launch of the final stage of this long running project will take place at the Whitsunday library in October with local dignitaries attending. A morning/afternoon tea will be provided and Zonta members will be invited to participate.
