While reading the applications I was reminded about the wonderful young women that we have in our community who will undoubtedly carry on our work of service and advocacy to improve the lives of women and girls.

Fast food industry brings employment to women in India

US fast food chains have become an unlikely source of female employment and empowerment in India where, traditionally, most women are kept from working outside the home.

In India, men significantly outnumber women, the result of selective abortion and infanticide. The female participation rate in India's labour force is among the lowest in the world at 27% of the total workforce, and those who do work are mostly employed on farms or as domestic workers.

US fast food chains are trying to bring better balance to these statistics. Almost half the employees in the five floors of food and fashion in suburban Dehli's Mall of India are women. Just across the street in the old shopping street even the women's clothing stores are almost entirely staffed by men.

The US chains say that women are great for business because they are generally more hygienic, customer-friendly and loyal, and the chains are striving to build work places that are conducive to women and acceptable to their conservative families.



Burger King teaches self-defence to its

women. Yum Brands, which runs Pizza Hut, KFC and Taco Bell, pays recruiters higher commissions for female candidates. It runs a mentorship program to help women become managers and holds workshops for women on topics ranging from accounting to management. The result is that more than 40% of its female employees are now managers.

Domino's has gender sensitisation classes for new recruits and offers rewards to stores that attract the most women. Some outlets at these chains are run solely by women; others let all-female crews run the morning shift so they can wrap up before dark.

McDonald's invites parents of employees to visit its stores. Fifty parents of new employees gathered at a new outlet McDonald's in Goa to try a Maharaja Mac and fries for the first time and also to find out whether their daughters would be safe. McDonald's managers told parents their daughters were now part of a multinational company that respected and promoted women.

One of the new employees, 21-year-old Rita, is the first woman in her family to work outside the home and, not only her parents, but her uncles and cousins showed up at her new workplace to investigate. Her father said "it's a big step for the family so we all wanted to be assured she is in good hands".

McDonald's also appoints a female confidante at every outlet, aiming to enable women to talk more freely about their personal lives and problems. The company gives mothers more flexible hours, and tries to keep women on after they are married by helping them to transfer to a different branch if they move to their husbands' homes.

When some families had concerns about their daughters wearing trousers, McDonald's tweaked its uniforms to make them look and feel more like traditional clothing.

Certainly the international fast food jobs are just scratching the surface, as most cities in India don't even have one global food chain, but where they have a presence many women working in the international chains are now making a career of it and earn sufficient to support their families.
