
and kept shouting, 'Good on you Zonta, been there, done that! '

## **Advocacy Report**



#### Spotlight on the Whitsundays.

Ironically, it's exactly 12 months ago that the first Whitsunday Festival of Motoring Campaign began. Started off as an idea and meetings on how we can be involved. Who knew how far it would go??

Many thought it was not a Zonta project and many didn't understand what it was all about. Afterall, what is Advocacy? Something I struggled to understand for a while.

However, the official definition is:

Supports, improving the status of women & women's rights and advocates to influence the laws & attitudes that effect women's lives at the club level, district and international levels.

How did we accomplish this through this campaign?

Step 1 – Find likeminded, strong women who believe in the same cause. Zonta members, Council Project Manager Lauren Penny and a female rally team Melinda Bergmann and Larisa Biggar.

Step 2 – Find a platform and medium to advocate on. Whitsunday Festival of Motoring, Domestic Violence Prevention Month, Qld Rally Championships and a region wide community event.

Step 3 – Reaching as many people as possible. Be seen, be heard, share the message and repeat.

When we started talking, we had no idea how far the campaign would go nor how many people we would reach with our message. What I do know now is we were heard that weekend, we definitely were seen, and we definitely got the message out there that Domestic Violence is not tolerated in our community or in the Queensland Rally community. We continue to be heard because we have been invited to showcase our club's achievements from this campaign at the District Conference in Brisbane in September.

What does this actually mean?

The 2019 District Conference is an inter-District Conference with Zontians from Districts 16, 23 and 24 from 6-8 September 2019.

## **Advocacy Spotlight**

Leanne Abbott is well known to our members. She is friends with several of our members and on visits always comes along to our meetings. This time last year Leanne was guest speaker at our GM. She spoke about her work teaching African students to sew and in particular, to make their own hygiene needs. Leanne is currently in Africa and sent this letter (email) to Pammie Harrison (who incidentally is also in Africa at the moment).

Hi,

Yesterday I began teaching at the school. I had a long talk with the teacher. She said there had been a lot of tears in her classroom. I have only been sending kits (hygiene kits) to the scholarship holders. Girls who are not receiving scholarships are asking why they don't qualify for a kit. Hence the tears. I should never as-



sume. I just thought that if parents have money for fabric for their children to attend class, they would have money for hygiene products. I must have pre-empted this problem because I had asked the Headmaster the number for all of the students. Thanks to the girls at Gosford High School and my sewing friends I had enough to give kits to all the girls who hadn't already received one.

The teachers mentioned that their inspection went really well. The Inspectors saw the photos, text books and kits as positive incentive for the education of these children. It's about keeping the girls particular at school-- not married and having babies. The support from Australia is helping to achieve this. The students also scored very well in their practical exam garment. The garments are marked externally.

I did have a major accident. When setting up the battery I accidently touched the black to the red---- or was it red to the black?? A big "OH NO!!". This meant that the inverter was fried and had to be sent 150km to be fixed!! Well, not quite. They couldn't fix it there so it had to be sent to Harare--- another 9hrs drive. I still don't know if it is fixed!

The lesson for the day became "black to black"; "red to red". I really believe there will not be a student at the school who will ever make my mistake.

For the rest of the lesson, the students embroidered their initial onto a piece of fabric that will eventually be a part of their needle case that they will make on the machine. The interesting thing is that they have never done any embroidery. A simple chain stitch became an exciting lesson. Now there is talk of putting some embroidery on their examination garment. Some good may have come from my accident.

# **Advocacy Spotlight Cont.**

Next day I turned up with inverter from the Orphanage. Every learner (as the students are called here) had a go machining with no thread on paper. Lots of laughter and many were scared of the machine. Learning to control the machine with their foot was foreign to them. Before I left, I demonstrated threading the machine. The simplicity brought many oos and rrrs.



The students were given kits and photos of the high school girls in Australia had helped cut the kits.

The solar panel is already on the roof. Fortunately, the teachers are experienced with electric machines and I feel that when the inverter arrives they and the students will be turning out even better garments.

## **Knitting Group: Friends of Zonta**




Dawn has celebrated her 70th birthday with family and friends. Dawn's beautiful cake was made by long time friend, Kay Harris

# Remembering one of our local ladies and past member of Zonta



Pam McLean passed away in June this year and will always be remembered as a staunch supporter of women's rights, providing support to those who were struggling.

Pam was a member of Whitsunday Zonta from Sept 2002 until May 2004.

Prior to joining Zonta, she was also part of the team that officially opened the doors of the Whitsunday Neighbourhood Centre in 1990, followed in 1992 by the Whitsunday Crisis Care and Women's Support Group (now known as Whitsunday Counselling and Support).

During her time there, she also co-opted a few other Zonta members to join the board.

Pam was also instrumental in establishing the Whitsunday Sexual Assault Service through the establishment of the Whitsunday Housing Assoc and the Tenancy Information and advice Centre. Through her dedication and tireless lobbying, services were funded and expanded into domestic violence support and counselling.

Pam retired in 2003 after 13 years working and striving for women's rights and making life for women and children in our community a safe and supportive place for all to belong.

With Whitsunday Counselling & Support, the Neighbourhood Centre and Whitsunday Housing, the enduring effect of her tireless work is ever-present, with the above organisations continuing to grow to include the Emergency Relief program for people in crisis and in 2005 the Youth Mentor Program. By 2015 the Emergency program had received 888 applications and the work for the Dole Program was introduced at the centre.

An amazing lady who will be sadly missed by the community at large.
