She has continued working with Education Queensland with children of immigrant parents.

Her experiences while growing up in East Germany were interesting including the time when the Berlin Wall "came down" in 1989. She immediately took advantage of the freedom to visit London. As in common with most Europeans, she has a command of a number of languages.

Birgit obviously enjoys her life in Australia and also maintains close contact with her family in East Germany.
