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HIGH MORTALITY AND MALNUTRITION AFFECT MUSLIM CHILDREN MOST— Says UN Children's Agency

Islamic States account for the world's highest child mortality rates, where 60 per cent of children who die from disease and malnutrition never make it to their first birthday.

Active partnerships among members to solve the problems affecting children in the Organization of Islamic Conference (OIC) States, and help from the wealthier members "coming to the aid of the poorer," are therefore desperately needed, it said.

"We are extremely encouraged by the vision and leadership being shown by the OIC and the Islamic Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (ISESCO) in mobilizing Islamic countries to accelerate progress for children," said Executive Director Anne M. Veneman. "UNICEF shares their commitment and stands ready to work with them to ensure that their actions have practical impact and generate concrete results for children," she added.

Over 4.3 million Muslim children worldwide under the age of five die every year, many will never attend primary school, and over one third suffer from persistent malnutrition, said the report, which will serve as a basis for discussions in the upcoming Ministerial meetings regarding Muslim children to be held in Morocco in November. In all, OIC Member States account for a quarter of the world's 2.3 billion children, in Africa. Asia and the Middle East.

Saharan Africa suffer from the most severe deprivations, and child mortality rates in the region are more than double the world average. Many OIC countries have some of the highest maternal mortality rates in the world: in Afghanistan, one in six pregnancies results in death. In African OIC Member States, there is one death for every 15 pregnancies, though globally the average is one in 74.

Primary school attendance is very low in OIC nations, with more than half the adult population illiterate, and sometimes 70 per cent of women unable to read and write.

"Much progress has been made," said Director-General of ISESCO, Dr. Abdulaziz Othman Altwaljri. "Investing in children and putting them at the centre of development strategies are the most effective ways to eliminate poverty and meet global development targets," he added.

Zonta Birthing Kit Project

A major issue confronting the status of women's health internationally is the continued high level of women dying while giving birth and/or the death of their babies during birth.

Of the deaths of women occurring during childbirth, 99% of the mothers are in developing countries with poor sanitation during birth being a major cause of mortality. An important initiative being undertaken by Zonta internationally is the birthing project which aims to reduce maternal and infant mortality during birth.

It has been calculated that over 525, 000 women die each year in childbirth and approximately 40% of all these maternal deaths are caused by infection and hemorrhage, which in many cases can be prevented simply by improving sanitation. Moreover, for every woman who dies in childbirth about 30 more (around 15 million) suffer injury, infection or disease which can leave them with embarrassing and debilitating lifelong problems. Zonta birthing kit is designed to reduce the likelihood of mother and child contracting infection during childbirth by providing supplies for a clean birth.

The birthing kit contains 6 simple and cost effective products to reduce infection, including: a plastic sheet for the mother to lie on; soap and gloves to ensure that the midwife has clean hands; cord for clean tying of the umbilical cord; a scalpel blade for a clean cut of the umbilical cord; and gauze to wipe secretions form the baby's eyes and the mother's perineum. These basic supplies cost only 70c per kit to produce and yet make a real difference in providing clean and safe childbirth.

The Zonta birthing kit was accepted as a District 23 service project at the 2003 conference and with the support of District 24 became a National Service Project and received Ausaid support in 2004. To-date 100,000 kits have been sent to 26 countries through 17 international organisations. The Zonta Birthing Kit project is supported by an AUSAID grant which matches dollar-for-dollar the contribution which are made by Zonta on a half-cash, half-labour donation.

The birthing kits are made at assembly days by Zonta Clubs nationwide. The Zonta Club of Adelaide Hills works with national and international organisations to sponsor and distribute kits throughout the world. The Adelaide Hills Club is requesting support of other Zonta Clubs nationwide in the form of a tax-deductible donation, an \$800 club contribution, or the running of an assembly day to make 1600 birthing kits.

As the time and costs involved are relatively minor compared to the overall benefits of such a project, it would be very worthwhile for Zonta Club of Brisbane East to consider gathering together friends and family (or joining with another club) to give one day a year for an assembly day to make birthing kits that can help improve the status of women's health internationally.
