ADVOCACY

As we approach Anzac Day 2018, I would like to tell the story of one of Australia's bravest wartime women.

In the Soldier Settler Irrigation Area of Loxton in Sth Australia (where I grew up), the roads are named after VC awardees. However, there are a couple that are different. Bullwinkle Road in Loxton Nth is named after a Military Nurse, Lt. Col. Vivian Statham (nee Bullwinkle). Vivian couldn't be awarded the VC but was awarded the highest nursing honour—the Royal Red Cross Florence Nightingale Medal. However, it has been stated that Vivian showed the courage and bravery of any VC awardee.

Vivian Bullwinkle, a military nurse, was among nurses, soldiers and civilians evacuated from Singapore during its fall to the Japanese in February 1942. They were on the SS Vyner Brooke which unfortunately was torpedoed and sunk four days later after coming under Japanese attack. There were 65 nurses on board-22 nurses survived the attack and made it to shore--- on Radji Beach, Bangka Island, Dutch East Indies (Indonesia). They lit fires as beacons hoping that it would lead them to safety. It didn't. They attended the wounded and sick-- many of whom were civilians and wounded soldiers who had also made it to shore. Eventually, Matron Drummond (another road name in the Loxton Irrigation district) suggested that the civilians walk to the nearest town, Muntok and surrender-- which they did. Earlier, one of the ship's crew had walked to the town of Muntok to surrender the group to the authorities but had encountered a Japanese military patrol. This patrol came back to the beach where the nurses and the wounded survivors were. They separated the soldiers from the group and massacred them. Then they lined the nurses and one civilian woman (who had stayed to care for her wounded husband) along the beach and ordered them to march out into the sea. The Japanese soldiers shot them in the back. They then shot and bayonetted the wounded. This action was one of the worst military atrocities of WW2.

Nurse Bullwinkle was shot --the bullet going through her abdomen, miraculously missing all vital organs. She managed to survive by feigning death. She eventually made it back to shore and hid in the jungle for 12 days attending her own wounds and those of a British soldier hiding with her.

Vivian eventually had to give herself up to the Japanese and became a POW for the remainder of the war. Like many other POWs, she had to hide her diary; couldn't speak of her ordeal to anyone, she hid her bullet ridden uniform.



During her time as a POW she tended fellow prisoners, caring for them with whatever she had. One can hardly begin to imagine the conditions in which she survived. When Lt. Vivian Bullwinkle was released in 1945, she weighed 4 stone (25KG).

In 1947 Vivian gave evidence at the Tokyo War Crimes Commission Trials. She resigned from the military that same year.

On her return to Australia, Vivian was determined to improve the recognition and standard of nursing training in Australia. From this, the current Nursing Degree evolved. She has also been the main instigator for the Nurses Memorial Centre in Melbourne, Nursing Scholarships and as mentioned, the advancement of educational standards for Australian nurses. She introduced the Nurse Aid role to nursing and the Palliative Care Nurse. She was also involved in the evacuation of orphans during the Vietnam War.





Lt. Col. Vivian Stratham (Bullwinkle) has been described by Dr. Brendan Nelson as "one of this country's most remarkable Australians".

Vivian died in July, 2000 aged 84yrs.

"This is all my fault"

These were the words tearfully spoken by Candice Warner when referring to the incidence of ball tampering in which her husband, David Warner is currently embroiled.

She didn't break any laws-neither did the rugby player.

This made my blood boil. It was no doubt done to put David off his game--which it did. But it was nothing less than bullying toward Candice--- an innocent, beautiful wife and mother. Not to mention her own world renowned sporting ability.

This brings me to a domestic violence myth:

"It's my fault that he hits me"

No it's not and it's not Candice Warner's fault that her husband decided to engage in premeditated ball tampering. I hope someone has told her that.

I doubt that it will happen but the Sth African players and officials involved in the bullying of Candice Warner should be brought to, account too. They actually, in my opinion, need counselling!

One good thing to come out of this incident is the start of dialog re the whole incidence of sledging in sport and in particular cricket. There is no need for it. It is purely and simply bullying— especially when it involves a player's loved ones. There is no place for it in in 2018. Surely we have evolved enough to realise this and the first team to stop it should be us— the Australian team, as it seems we are the best in the world at sledging. It is a disgrace and does nothing to help any anti-bullying campaign. Other sporting codes have made moves to stop this kind of thing— now it is time for the "gentlemanly" sport of cricket.

What hope do we have of eliminating violence when our sporting "heros" can get away with it.
